




CHILD POVERTY IS A PROBLEM WE CAN SOLVE.

Before the pandemic, 2 out of 5 North Carolina children lived in poor or low-income households. In 2020 and 2021, Congress put forward several relief packages that had a major impact in helping families withstand loss of jobs and income. These policies – especially the one-year expansion of the Child Tax Credit – reduced child poverty to historically low levels during 2021. This showed that child poverty is a problem we have the power to solve. Let's keep moving forward to solve it.

HEALTH COVERAGE IS KEY FOR FAMILY FINANCIAL STABILITY.

When parents are insured, children are more likely to be insured as well. And coverage for parents protects families from medical debt and financial strain caused by illness or injury. Congress has created big incentives for states like North Carolina to expand health coverage to those who do not quality for either Medicaid or subsidies under the Affordable Care Act. Expanding Medicaid in North Carolina would boost health and financial outcomes for children and their families in every county.
